WHY Standards Based Learning?

- > "We must shift from a focus on teaching or inputs to a deeper understanding of the process of *learning* and how we can influence it." Fullan and Quinn
- "Our goal is to accurately report student proficiency while maintaining student's confidence in their continual growth." Schimmer
- "The standards-based mindset is not about establishing flawless formulas, but rather a way for teachers to think as they
 examine evidence of learning students produce." Schimmer
- "Much of the so-called real world is standards-based...one meets the standard or they do not, as well as when one finally meets the standard, the new result does not typically mingle with any previous results. The most productive growth environments are the ones where employees see constructive feedback as a source of empowerment rather than criticism." Schimmer
- "Grades are not compensation. Grades are communication. They are an accurate report of where the student is at in their learning process." Wormeli
- "Students can hit any target they can see and which stands still for them." Stiggins
- "The grade is NOT the reward, nor can it ever be considered as such. Once a grade becomes a bartering tool, its power to inform stakeholders and be used to make instructional decisions or document progress accurately is impugned. "Wormeli
- "Learning is NOT a contest, game or competition. If we continue to organize it that way we will always have students who could succeed but give-up." Oldfield
- "Grading should be designed to improve communication, making clear to students, fellow teachers, and future teachers the academic performance of a student." Reeves
- "If I ran a school, I'd give the average grade to the ones who gave me all the right answers, for being good parrots. I'd give the top grades to those who made a lot of mistakes and told me about them, and then told me what they learned from them." R. Buckminster Fuller
